


# ABOUT THE OVER

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

## 1901

The Philippine
Commission, through
Act No. 74, establishes
a "Normal School for
the education of the
natives of the Islands
in the science of
teaching."The
Philippine Normal
School formally
opened in Intramuros
in September. Mr.
Elmer B. Bryan serves
as its first
superintendent.

# 1902

PNS moves to the old Exposition Grounds in Ermita (the site of the Philippine General Hospital). The school accepts some 250 enrolees of the more than 400 applicants. A year after, the first batch of students graduates.

# 1910

The first batch of students graduates under the four-year secondary curriculum.

## 1949

PNS is converted into the Philippine Normal College(PNC) through Republic Act 416.The bill was drafted by Senator Geronima Pecson and was lobbied with Senator Esteban Abada.

## 1950

PNC introduces the four-year BSEE program.

# 1984

Organizational structure takes place to meet new challenges. The Office of the Dean of Instruction was abolished and six new schools are created: the School of Education, the School of Languages and Linguistics, the School of Mathematics and Science, the School of Social Sciences, the School of Human Resources Development, and the School of Culture and Sports.



# 1912

PNS occupies the 3.7-hectare campus site. The Main Building is inaugurated after two years of construction.

## 1925

PNS adopts a two-year collegiate program.

# 1942

Japanese forces enter Manila. Japanese officials declare the end of the American occupation. PNS closes. Members of the Class of 1942 are declared graduates.

# 1946

The United States grants Philippine independence. PNS resumes operations.

# 1991

The Philippine Congress passes Republic Act 7168 an Act converting the Philippine Normal College into a state university to be known as the Philippine Normal University. A fourth campus is born in the municipality of Lopez in Quezon Province

# 1993

The Philippine Accrediting Association for Schools, Colleges and Universities (PAASCU) accredits all the academic programs in the Graduate College.

# 2009

The Congress of the Philippines passes Republic Act 9647, an Act Designating The Philippine Normal University as the Country's National Center for Teacher Education.

### 2012

PNU launches its Strategic Development 2012Plan (2012-2022) with the vision of becoming internationally recognized and nationally responsive teacher education university.

Henceforth, the new VMG served as the framework in planning the annual targets of each college and office unit at PNU.



#### STRENGTHENING THE CULTURE OF RESEARCH THROUGH POLICIES, CAPACITY TRAINING AND RESEARCH INCENTIVES

In keeping with the challenges and demands of knowledge generation and international competitiveness, PNU has to transition itself to become a research-oriented teacher education university by developing the research culture and cultivating excellence on research. Invigorating the academic community particularly faculty, staff, and students to engage in research production and translation necessitates formulation of research policies, enhancement of research infrastructure, creation of incentives and funding schemes and research capacity building for faculty, staff, and students.

# UNIVERSITY RESEARCH AGENDA (URA) AND RESEARCH INFRASTRUCTURE ENHANCED

Research infrastructure as an important driver of quality research production was critically examined. Foremost in this effort was the revisiting of and ensuring that PNU's URA is consonance with national priorities. The University Research Manual containing university research policies and mechanisms was also updated. Research facilities and other equipment and infrastructures were improved. A functional research office was ascertained to have competent manpower structure with a system for planning, implementing, monitoring, dissemination, publication, utilization and reporting of faculty research.

#### University Research Agenda

» The University revisited its Research Agenda in response to the strategic development plan of the University and the national research priorities of the government through consultations with multi-stakeholders in a forum held on September 14, 2012. The university research agenda is now on its refinement stage for its implementation in the academic year 2013.

» College research workshops were initiated and facilitated by College research coordinators and CREDE Director after revisiting the University Research Agenda - Dr. Maria Carmela Mancao and Dr. Wilma S. Reyes for College of Arts and Social Sciences; Prof. Maria Victoria Hermosisima for College of Education; Prof. Ramer Oxino for College of Languages, Linguistics and Literature; and Prof. Lucilla Fetalvero and Dr. Wilma S. Reyes for College of Science.

» A research workshop in Agusan Campus was also conducted and facilitated by Dr. Wilma S. Reyes on December 5, 2012.

#### Research Manual

The PNU Research Manual was updated in July 2012. Moving forward for the implementation of the new Strategic Directions of the University, major revisions of the University Research Manual are underway incorporating new research policies and implementing guidelines and procedures regarding research management, production, and publication.

#### · Research infrastructure

» The Director's office and the UCRSS (University Center for Research and Statistical Services) office were renovated with two new air conditioning units

» Executive chairs and computer chairs were provided for UCRSS

» A development plan for building a well-equipped Center for Research in Orata Hall was prepared for the expansion of CREDE's research services in line with the implementation of the new Strategic Directions on Research and Product Development. The second floor of Orata Hall is designed to provide efficient research services for the next academic year. Equipment and new research softwares such as SPSS, NVivo and Endnote were requested to facilitate statistical

- » Two (2) additional PNU faculty researchers, Dr. Antriman Orleans of COS and Prof. Adonis David of OSASS were given two non-teaching loads at CREDE during the second semester of SY 2012-2013.

#### **CHED-Funded Research**

To continually fulfill the mandate of PNU as the National Center for Teacher Education (NCTE), CHED has designated PNU as the Higher Education Regional Research Center (HERRC) through the efforts of the incumbent president, Dr. Ester B. Ogena. A grant of 17 million pesos was awarded to the University to fund the 11 proposals on the following research priorities: testing of different teacher education models, addressing key factors in successful teacher education programs, and other research topics that may contribute to the achievement of the country's education goals. The proposals were distributed to the colleges and centers of the University. The research projects will be implemented starting June 2013 and expected for completion at the end of academic year 2013-2014. 





#### PERFORMANCE BASED BONUS QUALIFIED

This year is the first of the Aquino Government's Performance Based Bonus (PBB) implementation. The incentive scheme aims to improve the delivery of goods and services to all Filipinos, as well as institute a culture of excellence in public service across the bureaucracy. Despite the tedious and thorough process of ascertaining that all Major Final Outputs are delivered based on targets and the rigorous forced ranking of employees, PNU was among the few State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) in the National Capital Region (NCR) that qualified to receive the PBB. As shown in the MFO Accountability Report Cart (MARC-1) and the Good Governance Accountability Report Card (MARC-2), PNU successfully achieved the required rating (i.e., 90% of the set targets) and met the accountability requirements on Transparency Seal, PhilGEPS Posting, Cash Advance Liquidation and Citizen's Charter. The specific ranking each delivery unit in the university vis-a-vis their perfomance in the 2012 PBB is also shown. It can be noted that the members of the PNU Management Team waived their right to be ranked "Best" or "Better." They were ranked as "Good" in relation to the grant of the Performance-Based Bonus in recognition of the invaluable contribution of the Faculty and the Staff in the attainment of the University's Performance Targets and Delivery of Services for FY 2012.

#### Transitioning to National Budget Circular No.461 (NBC 461)

In 2009, the BOR in two Board Resolutions terminated the use of PNU PAS Scheme as basis for faculty promotion and directed the university Administration to officially implement the NBC461 system in hiring and promoting the faculty.

During its 55<sup>th</sup> regular meeting on December 5, 2012, the BOR approved the transition Scheme/Formula for Faculty Promotion from Performance Appraisal Scheme (PAS) to National Budget Circular No.461 (NBC 461) as proposed by the Faculty and Academic Staff Evaluation Board (FASEB) and recommended by the Administrative Council.

The transition scheme involves getting the average of the faculty's PAS evaluation points obtained in 2006 and the NBC461 points up to 2010 as evaluated by the Computer Department of Integrated Research and Training Center based in the Technological University of the Philippines (TUP).

#### The transition formula will be implemented following two strategies:

A. Once the validated NBC461 points of faculty are released by the TUP ZONAL Evaluation Center, the appointment of faculty based on the corresponding academic rank issued will be approved. However, the adjustment in compensation will take effect once the DBM released the fund.

B. Upon release of funds by the DBM, the faculty will be given appointments based on their transition scores, i.e. the average of PAS points in 2006 and the NBC461 points as evaluated by TUP, subject to availability of funds. The salary of faculty will be differentiated to be funded by the Special Trust Fund (STF) in case the transition score is higher than NBS461 points.

#### Level III Re-accreditation

To ensure the quality of exisiting academic programs, PNU submitted 25 academic programs in 12 cluster programs for level III re-accreditation with the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP). On December 10, 2012, PNU received the AACCUP Board Action granting Level III re-accredited status for the undergraduate programs below as assessed by AACCUP on October 15-16, 2012 and October 22, 2012.


# Systems-Based Solutions

PNU is optimizing ICT for efficient governance and service by developing and implementing various computer systems to automate its services.

One major move in line with PNU's modernization program is the implementation of the PNU Web-Based School System (PWEBSS). This system allows online enrolment and other web-based transactions for all students and clients of the university. After thorough discussions on the salient features of the proposal and the postive response from the student leaders, the PWEBSS was made into a policy with BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1730, S. 2012.




Besides the PWEBSS, a Document Tracking System was developed and implemented to facilitate the efficient flow of communication between and among offices by easier and faster tracking of documents




Several computer systems were also designed and developed like the following:



- Web-based Inventory System for Property and Supplies
  - Online requisition of supplies and equipment geared towards providing a more systematic delivery of support services



- Web-based Human Resource Information System (HRIS)
  - Comprehensive online database of faculty and employees



- PNU Board of Regents (BOR) Resolution Catalogue System
  - Database management system for electronic storage and easier retrieval of BOR Resolutions

With funding from the Commission on Higher Education, PNU developed and now host the **Teacher Resource Web Portal**. The portal provides easily accessible, reliable and free resources that can help teachers and students upgrade their pedagogical content knowledge and



competencies. It aims to enable the faculty and students of more than 1,200 TEIs to share their intellectual outputs like researches, multimedia presentations, projects, syllabi, modules, assessment tools and other knowledge resources, thereby creating a network of "bayanihan" among mentors and future teachers.




The e-PNU Learning Management System is the university's platform for online learning.

## BUILDING INTERNATIONAL NETWORK AND LINKAGES

PNU's aim to be a globally recognized teacher education institution had to be matched with strategic and specific steps while it performs its mandate and mission of producing future excellent and innovative teachers and education leaders. To leverage the university's efforts for global positioning, Dr. Ogena's has intensified her efforts to connect with international agencies and personalities.

In 2012, Dr. Ogena was invited to be a member of the Steering Committee of the APEC Learning Community Builders (APEC ALCOB) and member of the Advisory Committee of the Asia Pacific Collaborative Education Journal (APCEJ). In these capacities, she was invited to talk on education policies, issues, and green growth and technology during the 8th APEC Futre Education Forum in GyeongJu, Korea on 22-23 May 2012, as organized by the Institute of APEC Collaborative Education (IACE) and hosted by the Ministry of Education, Science and Technology (MEST), Korea.

To prepare for the country's hosting of APEC in 2015, Dr. Ogena, former APEC International Coordinator for Human Resource Development for Industry and Technology (HURDIT), joined the CHED Chairperson Dr. Patricia B. Licuanan and CHED Regional Director Dr. Caridad O. Abuan to participate in the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) International Conference on Education held in Vladivostok, Russia on 9-10 July 2012. The conference, participated by the APEC member economies namely: Korea, China, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, Malaysia, Indonesia, Russia, Hong Kong, USA, Canada and the Philippines, focused on the best practices for forging global cooperation of universities among APEC economies.

Building strong connections and solidify relationship with other universities abroad is integral to internationalization. Dr. Ogena's official visits to universities abroad have earned PNU significant international network and linkages. In these trips, she made sure that her officials also join her for them to benchmark with universities being visited and broaden their professional network and linkage.

On 14 August 2012, Dr. Ogena was invited by Dr. Seung-In Nam, President of Daegu National Unviersity of Education (DNUE), to sign a MOA with DNUE and the Province of Gyeongsangbuk-Do for multicultural partnership, particularly on (1) Joint development and implementation of multicultural education programs; (2) Training and camp for the children of multicultural families; and (3) Joint research projects on multicultural education. The RCTQ is an applied research and development center estalished to create an environment for building applied research capacity at PNU and overtime, throughout the Philippines and improving the capacity of teachers to deliver quality educational outcomes and, the capacity of the Philippine people to meet and address the human capital needs of an economically strong and socially cohesive and politically stale society.

### **COLLABORATIVE ACTIVITIES WITH THE 3NS AND OTHER AGENCIES**

A vigorous year for PNU was also seen for its collaboration and partnership efforts with various organizations, agencies, as well as education institutions in the country. Foremost in these partnerships is the continued and strengthened partnership of PNU with the National Network of Normal Schools (3NS). PNU as the Lead Shephered of the 3NS, which was established on September 1, 2011 with the support of CHED Commissioner Nenalyn P. Defensor, implemented innovative projects this year in line with academics, research and forums.

Inspired by the Erasmus Mundus concept in Europe, Dr. Ogena proposed a Local Erasmus Program, which the 3NS implemented and dubbed as the "Normalite" Program. This academic program aims to enrich the experience of students by deploying them to a 3NS-member "Normal School" for a semester of practice teaching. Students also learn the local settings and immerse themselves to various local cultures that will make them more flexible and effective teachers in the future. Workshops and meetings of 3NS University Presidents, Vice Presidents and Registrars were held to ensure the success of this feat.

As the NCTE, PNU initiated an RTD on the **New Teacher Education Curriculum** participated in by 3NS Presidents, VP for Academics, and stakeholders, including the CHED Technical Panel for Teacher Education, Professional Regulation Commission-Board of Professional Teacher, and the Teacher Education Council.

## AGREEMENTS MADE WITH OTHER PARTNERS

PNU entered into agreements with various local organizations like the Vibal Publishing House Inc., HopeNet, Canossa School. It also sealed a partnership with the Department of Science and Technology - Science Education Institute (DOST-SEI)

PNU-Vibal Publishing House partnership shall provide a framework for effective collaboration to share expertise on integrating technology with education by putting up two digital education projects of PNU for faculty and students such as the Tablet PC Classrom of the PNU Center for Teaching and Learning, and the PNU-Vibal Center for Digital Education Desktop PC Classroom.



PNU's partnership with Hope Street Association, Inc seeks to establish online and onsite charter learning programs to be known as the Learning and Social Evolution Program with the following components:

**HopeNet** – an online character building an knowledge software designed for elementary and high school students

**HopeGames** – a global community simulation game for children to use the virtual world as model to create hope and improve real communities

**Learning Evolution System** – a program that teaches educators to turn their traditional lesson plans into challenging games for children.



Partnership and collaboration on research and development programs with **DOST-Science Education Institute** was also forged. Specifically, this tie up will allow for collaboration on researches related to teacher training and teacher education, as well as for SEI to test and pilot products and materials developed by PNU.

An agreement with **Canossa School** was signed to help them in their teacher training programs.



PNU also signed agreemets with private institutions like CENTEX Manila, IETI and Paref Woodrose establish linkages and partnership with private schools for practicum experiences of PNU practice teachers.

### TRAINING PROGRAMS AND OTHER SERVICES

In support of the re-tooling and knowledge and skills upgrade of the in-service teachers, the university conducted several training programs together with its various partners like the Department of Education (DepEd), Vibal Publishing House, and the 4th District of Quezon Province. The university trained 683 trainors from DepEd who will in turn train Grade 8 teachers who will handle Values Education, English and Filipino.

The university also hosted the DepEd's National Training of Teachers on major subjects like Values Education, Math, Araling Panlipunan, Science, Filipino and English with 1,784 teachers in attendance spread throughout a three-week period from May 14-28,

2012.



Upon the request of Congressman Lorenzo Tañada III, PNU conducted trainings on K to 12 to 189 principals and school administrators from the 4th District of Quezon Province specifically on Enhancing Critical Thinking and Problem Solving Skills In Science, Mathematics, and English: Key to Economic Sustainability and Progress and Academic Leadership Quality (ALQ): Meeting Challenges in the Implementation of the K-12 Curriculum.



Together with Vibal Publishing House, PNU held a conference on the *Teacher Proficiency Development Program in ICT Across Disciplines* that primarily aimed to train teachers in basic education on the use of ICT in the teaching-learning process. Around 70 teachers were invited to attend this seminar.

Led by the College of Science, a three-day educator's conference on the Recent Trends and Innovations in Science, mathematics and Technology: Towards Benchmarking Initiatives on Global Competitiveness and Internationalization was conducted from October 25-27, 2012.

The College of Education also conducted the following SPED Training Programs in cooperation with DepEd in summer:

- a. Training Program for Teachers of Children with Mental Retardation
- b. Training Program for Teachers of Children with Visual Impairment
- c. Training Program for Teachers of Children with Giftedness and Talent
- d. Training Program for Teachers of Children with Learning Disabilities
- e. Training Program for Teachers of Children with Hearing Impairment



Around 2,800 in-service teachers were trained with these programs that PNU spearheaded.



# Responsiveness to Stakeholders

Respond effectively and innovatively to the needs, demands, and requirements of the different stakeholders to actualize/demonstrate the University's relevance and leadership.



### **EXPANDING STUDENT INTAKE**

The university as the National Center for Teacher Education (NCTE) is dedicated to effectively and innovatively respond to the needs, demands and requirements of different stakeholders to actualize/demonstrate its relevance and leadership. The PNU Management took brave and bold steps in reinventing the admission policies and practices and reaching out to students from other regions converting its campuses into educational hubs.

As NCTE, it is PNU's desire to take in as many students from other regions with the vision of nurturing innovative and excellent teachers even in the farthest provinces in the country. This meant reducing intake from NCR and nearby provinces. However, this goal is not an issue of recruitment alone. A much bigger factor for students' decision to choose PNU as their undergraduate alma mater is their daily sustenance for four years until they finish their degrees. Hence, the PNU management offered a scholarship package to top five PNU Admission Test (PNUAT) passers per region, which includes full support for tuition and miscellaneous fees, free accommodation and monthly allowance.



### PNU CAMPUSES AS NCTE

Designating the PNU campuses into educational hubs was a necessary and timely move for Dr. Ogena. Like the PNU main campus in Manila, these campuses need to develop their own identity and be known at what they do best. Given their current resources and technical capacity, with foresight on where they can best position in the tight competition of teacher education, the four campuses of PNU were designated as the NCTE Hubs as follows:

- PNU Agusan as NCTE Multicultural Education Hubs
- PNU Cadiz as NCTE Environmental and Green Technology Hub
- PNU Isabela as NCTE Indigenous People Hub
- PNU Quezon as NCTE Technology & Livelihood Education Hub.

These hubs will serve as sites for research, planning, design and collaboration, technology capacity building, training, production of materials, and innovative programs for different sectors and groups in the country. Further, the designation would set directions for developing the campuses while giving them a particular area of responsibility. It will also allow opportunity to package local and foreign funding and possible academic and institutional partners for the different campuses. As hubs, the campuses can implement training programs related to their focus and eventually capacitate the campuses to compete against leading universities in the region. PNU Agusan will have the following focus - multicultural education, multicultural research and multicultural production. PNU Cadiz will offer the following – program and training on waste segregation and solid waste management, energy conservation center and renewable energy research. PNU Isabela will provide T2 for IP (Teach IP and Train IP) wherein the program takes into consideration the specific demands of educating the IPs using the knowledge and identity akin to them. PNU Quezon will concentrate on the three major dimensions - community and livelihood programs, self-reliance and sustainable environmental management and research capability.

As PNU continues to maintain its legacy as the front-runner in nation building through education, it sees opportunities in further advancing the country's interests by redesigning itself as the lead agency in introducing innovative programs and projects. The approved hubs aim to reinvent education in the country.

Different initial programs and projects were undertaken by the four PNU campuses for the approved hubs.

PNU Isabela started with the Bridging Program of 29 members of the different Indigenous Peoples. Closely coordinated with the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples, this Bridging program for the IPs intends to prepare them for the mainstream education.



PNU Agusan initiated a similar bridging program for some members of different IPs and Multicultural groups in the region. The program intends to prepare the selected students for the University's entrance examination.

PNU Quezon linked with local groups to jumpstart the TLE hub. The initial collaborations were done with other local universities in the area like PUP Quezon. The collaboration is focused on curriculum partnership and technology sharing.

### **REACHING OUT TO COMMUNITIES**

Extension activities of the university continue to be strengthened to sustain the need to reach out to street children and urban poor families in our adopted communities such as Families and Children for Empowerment and Development Foundation (FCED), Brgy. 843, a community in Pandacan Manila, Gawad Kalinga and Caritas Manila, under the parishes of Sto. Niño and St. Vincent de Paul in Paco, Pandacan, Manila.

The extension partnership binds the adopted communities and PNU to serve and improve the quality of life of the people in the adopted community. Faculty, students, staff and alumni are expected to actively engage in various community extension services as part of PNU commitment to its function as a university.

Being the premiere teacher-training institution in the country, the NSTP in PNU primarily caters to Literacy Training Service and community development. The Student Facilitators' Program (SFP) was created to enhance leadership and facilitation skills of student leader volunteers. They are the ones who responded to the call for spirit of volunteerism who extended help to the NSTP Coordinator and the NSTP Facilitator & Technical Assistant to carry out the implementation of NSTP in the university. They undergo different training activities such as GK Training Camp last June 30 to July 1, 2012 in General Trias, Trece Martirez, Rover Scout Training on August 4-5, 2012 and Eco Challenge Training held last September 26 and 29, 2012.

As part of the Literacy Enhancement Program, NSTP students were deployed in seven (7) partner organizations and communities such as Families and Children for Empowerment and Development Foundation (FCED), Gawad Kalinga-Baseco, DepEd Kindergarten, DepEd- Alternative Learning Systems, Department of Social Welfare (DSW), Rizal Park under National Parks and Development Committee (NPDC) and PNU Library to provide tutorial services and assistance in different school and baranggay day care centers.

### STUDENTS' GRANTS-IN-AID PROGRAM FOR POVERTY ALLEVIATION (SGP-PA)

An initiative of the Aquino government, the Students' Grants-In-Aid Program For Poverty Alleviation (SGP-PA) is being implemented by CHED in partnership with DSWD and DOLE. The SGP-PA has been set in place to contribute to the National Government's program thrusts that effectively address poverty alleviation by increasing the number of graduates in higher education among poor households, with the end in view of enabling these graduates to attain employment in high-value added occupations, in order to lift their families out of poverty and thereby contribute productively to national development. As the lead university in NCR in CHED's Disbursement Acceleration Program (DAP), PNU was identified to take in 102 student beneficiaries of the SGP-PA. Dr. Ogena formed the **Project 102 Committee** to focus on this project lead by Dr. Aurora Fulgencio as Dean of the Office of Student Affairs and Student Services (OSSASS).

### ADMISSION TO PNU AND THE BRIDGING PROGRAM

Sixty-four (64) applicants from poor households in NCR (54) and Region IV-B (10) covered under the DSWD's *Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino* (4Ps) took the PNU Admission Test (PNUAT), were interviewed and have expressed their interest to pursue a degree in Education were admitted at PNU. However, a bridging program was necessary since majority of these beneficiaries did not pass the PNUAT. The bridging program called Academic Intervention Program (AIP) includes Reading, Language, Mathematics, Values, Civics and Personality Education. Volunteer PNU faculty members prepared modules and lessons especially for the SGP-PA students, and monitored and evaluated the performance of the student scholars. When the PNUAT was again administered after the program, significant difference in the PNUAT mean scores of the SGP-PA students before and after the Bridging Program was found. Students who did not pass the first PNUAT but passed the second PNUAT (cutoff = 80) = 12. These 12 students were transferred to regular sections. The rest were formed into one section.


# Sustainability

Embed in the University system the value of environmental sustainability, continuing growth, and forward thinking.



While sustainability efforts for the university's growth and future position as an academic institution seems complex as it requires every element in the system to coherently function well towards the desired direction, looking at its financial sustainability is vital to ignite and power up other efforts. Hence, it is the goal of Dr. Ogena's leadership to increase its budget from the national government as well as beef up its income generation.

### LOBBIED FOR HIGHER BUDGET ALLOCATION



The graph showing the university's allocation from year 2007 to 2013 clearly depicts that PNU's allocation from the General Appropriations Act (GAA) has always been below 300 Million Pesos. For years from 2007 to 2012, it is very apparent that Personal Services (PS) largely comprise the budget (80% on average), while the Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) covered only around than one-fifth of the total budget and the Capital Outlay (CO) has been a meager average of three million pesos (Php 3 M) for the first three years but allocation was completely gone for the succeeding years. This trend in the PNU budget had contributed much to the deterioration of equipment and infrastructure in the campus.

In 2012 therefore, the PNU Management seriously lobbied for increase during the budget call for 2013, from the regional up to the senate budget hearings. Before the year came to a close, PNU had a confirmed budget of more than 500 Million Pesos, a 200 Million Pesos increase from its usual GAA allocation that is mostly particularly the MOOE and CO. Such significant development served as a huge inspiration for the PNU Management as they hope to modernize its facilities and infrastructure.

### **INCOME GENERATION INTENSIFIED**

Albeit the budget increase from the General Fund, the need for additional income remains to complete other projects in the university. Dr. Ogena's management was resolute in growing its income to allow more innovations and better delivery of services in the university.


Various income generating schemes were proposed and approved by the BOR. One is for the scholarship donors (both from government and private sectors) to pay not only the tuition and miscellaneous fees of their recipient but the amount from the Special Trust Fund that PNU is spending for each student as well. With BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1760, S. 2012, the rate of fees for students funded/supported by scholarship donors took effect first semester of SY 2012-2013, as follows:

a.Php 4,535.00- Manila b.Php 3,935.00- Agusan and Cadiz c.Php 2,735.00- Isabela and Quezon

New rate of fees for the Licensure Examination for Teachers (LET) Review Classes in the Main Campus were also implemented with BOR approval under BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1791, S. 2012. The new fees are:

- Php 2,000.00 for PNU Graduates
- Php 5,500.00 for Non- PNU Graduates
- Php 3,600.00 for Non-PNU Graduates without majorship


The BOR also approved the collection of Php 3,000.00 from each reviewee of the Librarian Licensure Examination (BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1844, S. 2012), which used to be managed fully by the Dept. of Library and Information Science in the College of Languages, Linguistics and Literature.




From the graph depicting the number of LET reviewees at PNU, it is obvious that there is not much increase in the number of reviewees with 3,465 and 3,667 in 2011 and 2012, respectively. However, the graph on income from LET reviews reveals that the income increased

four times from 2011 to 2012. This development can be attributed to the new rate of fees for the LET review.

The University, for the first time, conducted review classes from 20-23 October, 2013 for DepEd teachers and heads who would like to take the examination for principalship of the National Qualifying Examination for



School Heads. Each reviewee paid Php 4,500 (BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1844, S. 2012), which covers supplies, materials and personal services (lecturer, material writer, staff, clerk, writer and consultant). Around 500 aspiring principals attended the review classes.



As shown in the graph on the total income generated by the university in the last five years, PNU's income has slowly picked up from 2010 to 2012. These above-mentioned income-generating activities helped the university raise the budget it uses to augment for other projects at PNU like research and infrastructure. The LET review for example, as discussed earlier, has made a noticeable contribution to the Special Trust Fund (STF) of the university.

### **FACILITIES IMPROVED**

Being over a hundred-year old university, a lot of facilties at PNU have deteriorated with time. The daunting task of restoring and rehabilitating the buildings and providing for up-to-date equipment and facilites to PNU students for their optimum learning was eased with the help of CHED. Through its Disbursement Acceleration Fund program where it alloted Php 17 Million for PNU infrastructure, the university was able to propose for the following projects:

The PNU Foundation, Inc. was established to provide support to the development efforts of the Philippine Normal University as it fulfills its mandate as the country's National Center for Teacher Education (NCTE).

Specifically, the PNUF aims to receive donations from individuals and institutions and do active generation of resources for activities intended to support PNU in its pursuit of its mandate thru the following:

- a) Faculty and staff development
- b) Construction of infrastructure and improvement of university facilities
- c) Scholarships to needy and deserving students
- d) Support for research and development
- e) Activities towards institutional improvement







# HUMAN CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

Ensure an enriching, fair, and healthy work environment which promotes professional growth and career advancement for faculty and staff and guarantee a steady supply of highly competent human resource.



### **FACULTY AND STAFF DEVELOPMENT POLICIES**

To ensure the professional growth of PNU faculty, numerous policies and programs for faculty development were crafted and implemented by the management in 2012. The PNU management reviewed and revised the Professional Development and Incentive Program (PDIP) contract for doctoral students. The PDIP of the following faculty were approved by the BOR: Prof. Ma. Paz Morales, Ph.D. in Science Ed major in Physics (DLSU); Prof. Pacita Narzo, Ph.D. in Music Program (UP Diliman); Prof. Adolfo P. Roque, Ph.D. in Science Ed major in Chemistry (DLSU); Prof. Arceli Amarles, Ph.D. in Applied Linguistics (DLSU); Prof. Merry Ruth Gutierrez, Ph.D. in Reading, (PNU).

Amnesty Program for Faculty with PDIP refund obligation

For those who already availed of this scholarship but unable to finish their

Graduate studies (Master's or Doctorate), a refund obligation amnesty was proposed and subsequently approved by the BOR (BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1792, S. 2012). This amnesty program aims to provide relief to faculty members who failed to meet the conditions of the scholarship contract as salary deduction for payback is temporarily suspended, thus giving them time to finish their degrees. In essence, the amnesty is a moratorium on payment of refund to the University of the full amount the faculty received during the period of their study leave with pay.

The management also amended the guidelines on the grant of honoraria for PNU continuing education & training and development programs & projects since the existing rates are way too low and not comprehensive enough to cover different activities and various personnel involved in the programs and projects. Rates of honoraria in the guidelines have gone through the process of consultation and thorough study by a committee and the Admin Council and were finally approved with BOR RESOLUTION NO. U-1726, S. 2012.

The BOR also approved the staffing modification through abolition of twenty-one (21) academic positions and creation of forty-one (41) Instructor I & II positions. To abolish higher faculty positions brought about by the retirement of 21 faculty members that resulted to vacant faculty ranks, scrap-and-build approach was adopted. Newly-hired faculty members of the University have beenevaluated using NBC461 to the ranks of Instructors. The Instructor I positions in the plantilla have been evaluated basically filled up and occupied, hence the proposal to create instructor positions out of the 21 academic positions for abolition. Faculty items go up as the faculty move up the academic ladder using the NBC461 instrument for promotion.



On 13 January 2012, the PNU President launched the program INSPIRE, an acronym that stands for Innovation Support and Promotion of Initiatives in Research and Education. This is an umbrella program to catalyze development and sustainability of efforts for creating a culture of innovation and research in education. This aims to strengthen the major functions of the university namely, instruction, research and linkages and extension services; and seeks to support the President's vision and action agenda for the university. The following are the eight projects under Project INSPIRE:

### 1.Innovation Trigger Project

- an ICT grant to full time faculty including adjunct professors to develop education materials using ICT

### 2. Research and Product Development Projects

 composed of policy researches and international benchmarking, educational Innovations (e.g., developing new pedagogical approaches), product development (micro-scale kits, modules, etc.) and the Establishment and operationalization of database

### 3. "Normalite" Program (Philippine Erasmus Program)

 having two components: Program A (Student exchange program) which is one semester students exchange among 3NS institution and Program B (PNU Young Ambassador's Program) where PNU students' practice teaching will be in their province of origin

### 4. Foreign Language Proficiency Program for PNU Faculty

about Capacitating PNU faculty in various foreign languages

### 5.Innovation Awards

 a recognition system for PNU students, faculty and staff to innovate pioneering innovative products that can be useful in schools or workplaces The Innovation Trigger Project was carried out through the ICT grant where PNU faculty, including administrative staff who are teaching, can avail of the Php 10,000 outright support for procuring ICT gadgets. At the end of this year, a total of 149 faculty and staff have taken advantage of this program from Manila Campus (96), Lopez Campus (5), Isabela Campus (28) and Agusan Campus (20).



### Some results

With only year, concrete results were already seen as consequences of the policies implemented. A better picture of faculty profile for 2012 relative to 2011 based on highest educational attainment is apparent as shown in the chart. It can be observed that the proportion of faculty with doctorate degree went up slightly higher in Manila Campus and increased tremendously for Lopez and Cadiz Campus. The proportion of those who obtained their master's degree increased in Manila, Isabela and Agusan Campuses. Desirably, those only Bachelor's graduate have decreased within a year of Dr. Ogena's admistration.


### LICENSURE EXAMINATION FOR TEACHERS 2008-2012














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





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
